AGRICULTURE & LANDSCAPE DESIGN





COMPUTER & INFORMATION SCIENCE

n the third quarter, most Computer and Information Science students are working on finishing their PC Pro certifications. In addition, the second class being offered from Westmoreland Community College, is in full swing. It is called Digital Forensics Fundamentals, and it is taught through Zoom lectures and an online service called Cengage. Seniors have been learning the specifics of Microsoft Excel and Access in preparation for the hands-on NOCTIs.

AUTOMOTIVE COLLISION

In Automotive Collision this quarter, students are detailing and performing body repair. While underclassmen are working on Mr. Shaw's Limited Edition Body PT Cruiser, the seniors are preparing for the NOCTI exam by modifying fenders to make them look brand new. In addition to body repair and painting, students are working hard to restore client's cars and boats for the upcoming fishing season.





AUTOMOTIVE MECHANICS

During the third quarter of the school year, Auto Tech students have been hard at work. Recently, our second year students have been carefully disassembling strut assemblies and other suspension components. Currently they are learning how to properly remove coil springs and leaf springs from underneath vehicles and either replace them with new components or return the old ones to the underside after being cleaned or repaired. Third year participants can take their State Emissions and Inspection classes at a reduced cost and they can earn both licenses.

CONSTRUCTION TRADES

his quarter, the students in Construction Trades have been very productive. In the Carpentry shop, second year rotation students completed their 4'x8' Tiny House projects and had the opportunity to work on various community projects including Greensburg Salem Middle School and Youngwood Borough. While working with Electricity and Plumbing, students continued building electrical booths and bathrooms. Additionally, they learned to wire complex circuits. Lastly, in Masonry, students built brick and block pillars and walls. They also proceeded to improve their mortar-making skills.





COSMETOLOGY

here is exciting news in Cosmetology. Level One students have been working on permanent waves and processing. They have also been learning spa facials that include steam machine and specialty mask treatments. Level Two students are mastering color correction, updos, waxing, and acrylic nails. Level Three participants are studying to get their Cosmetology licenses. So far we have taken the written portion of the NOCTI and will be taking the practical component in the near future. Everyone is striving to finish all 1250 hours while also looking forward to the Chicago Hair Show Field Trip!

CULINARY ARTS

n our cooking class, we have expanded our culinary knowledge and skills through various activities such as learning different knife cuts, trying out different recipes, making charcuterie boards, baking cupcakes, and serving food for meetings. We have also explored spices and their ability to enhance flavors in various dishes. Cooking different types of food has further improved our abilities and taught us about unique techniques and tastes. Proper knife usage has been emphasized, teaching us precision and artistry. Overall, we have gained valuable information that will benefit our future pursuits.

ELECTRICAL TECHNOLOGY

n Electrical Technology, we are diving into important tasks such as setting up service entrances, handling branch circuits, and perfecting the installation of ceiling fans. Additionally, we are preparing for the NOCTI exams, which evaluate our grasp of electrical principles and practices. Through a blend of hands-on performances and instruction, we are acquiring the expertise needed for future roles in the electrical field once we graduate.



HEALTH OCCUPATIONS

The Health Occupations program has many exciting things taking place. Seniors are preparing for their NOCTI testing by practicing skills such as vital signs, bed to wheelchair transfer of patients, and dressing and undressing patients. Additionally, students learned medical filing and charting systems. They now know how medical records are organized alphabetically and numerically. The class also visited Westmoreland County Community College to look at the health programs they offer. Lastly, students are anticipating their field trips to Redstone, Westmoreland Manor, and Saint Anne's residential homes where they will explore possible job opportunities.



MULTIMEDIA DESIGN

Multimedia Design is having so much fun this quarter! Our most recent assignments have included fashion design, character design, and storyboarding. Fashion design makes us think about clothing trends and the thoughts provoked by statement clothing. Character design focuses on shape language and conveying a story through items instead of words. Storyboarding helps teach us organization for an upcoming film project. Each of these creative lessons will assist with future projects and job experiences. Seniors have also been diligently practicing for the upcoming NOCTI exam. It will test their knowledge and application of all the lessons they have practiced over the years. We are excited to see where the 4th quarter takes us.





HVAC & STEAMFITTING

Right now we are currently engineering spiral ductwork for our Robotics Engineering and Manufacturing program at CWCTC. We have been setting anchors and struts so that the duct can hang with adequate support from the ceiling. We will be running two sets roughly sixty feet long. This will supply heating and cooling to the entire shop area so that the machines can be at a constant temperature. We have also been learning how to use a concrete hole saw rig. Additionally, we practiced how to mount and level the drill to a concrete wall and use a wet core bit to penetrate concrete for plumbing pipe or flue pipe from the multiple units in our shop. As a final project, the class has constructed multiple header systems for all of the flue pipes to attach. This prevents back draft. All of this has come together to help us learn the skills we need to be employable in the field of HVAC/ Plumbing.



POWERLINE

Powerline juniors are doing some challenging electrical projects and learning how to bend conduit and the seniors are gaining valuable skills including operating the bucket and digger truck, material identification and pole top rescue. They are also preparing for NOCTI testing and Duquesne Light is coming in to test our seniors on what they know. Everyone is getting hands-on experience in different aspects of the field!

PROTECTIVE SERVICES


Protective Service students are working through Winter this quarter. AM-1st year individuals are busy learning the details of Law Enforcement including their favorite day of the week: "Firearm Friday." PM students have been busy mastering EMS skills such as splinting, patient assessments, and traumatic injury interventions. The close of the quarter will have all Protective Services participants transitioning into new tasks and preparing for National Registry for Emergency Medical Technicians testing, and IFSAC/ProBoard Firefighter I examination!






RESTORATION & DESIGN

his quarter we have been busy with pallet wall installations. Both CWCTC offices, and the Belle Vernon Administrative Office received a new look with these designs. AM has been working on wood finishing, and staining. PM has been learning Wallpaper applications. We had a field trip to Greensburg Middle School to help them with their Administrative department. NOCTI testing is next for our Seniors. As a result, we are preparing the walls, doors and trim for these assessments.





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SERVICE OCCUPATIONS

During the third quarter, students in the AM session of Service Occupations worked towards ServSafe Food Handler Certification while PM students delved into OSHA-10 training for workplace safety. AM students also focused on dining room tasks and one PM group explored the art of crafting pasta dishes, casseroles, and sauces, while mastering the technique of making roux and bechamel sauces. Additionally, they focused on restocking duties, managing the snack shop and custodian closet, and ensuring an ample supply of printer paper. This holistic approach provided students with practical skills for various service-oriented roles.



ROBOTICS ENGINEERING & MANUFACTURING - REM

In the REM program, on Mr. Sedlacek's side we are learning how to use Mastercam and operate Lathes and Mills. We get to machine the parts we design on Mastercam. On Mr. Pelzer's side, we have been working on Robots, AutoCad Drafting, and some Electronics Projects. We have also been assigned various Tooling U tasks on our school computers.

SPORTS MEDICINE

n Sports Medicine, our seniors are preparing for their NOCTI tests, while the 2nd year students are learning about elbow, wrist, and hand anatomy, and how to evaluate and diagnose various sports and activity-related injuries. Students will measure the range of motion of the wrist and elbow using a goniometer and determine how to determine muscle weakness with manual muscle tests (MMT). They will then create and implement elbow, wrist, and hand rehab programs and work one on one with each other. First year students are learning about the different lower leg muscle compartments, as well as their origins, insertions, and actions.
